1. Introduction:

Chronic disease is one of the key priority health areas identified by the Governance Group of the DHBRF. Chronic diseases include diabetes, cardiovascular disease and respiratory disorders and other illnesses with long term health effects. Long-term care could be in all areas and with broad patient demographics including paediatrics, mental health, frail elderly or adult medical.



Chronic conditions cause over 80 per cent of all deaths in New Zealand and the prevalence of these problems will rise exponentially over the coming decades. This burden includes the gross financial impact on national health services as well as that on patients, their carers and families. Addressing this issue at a prevention level is considered the best way to target these conditions. Increasing awareness of these diseases, long term consequences for patients and managing current levels of illness are just some of the key issues we face.



2. Harry Rea: Clinician and Research Expert in Chronic Care Management:

Professor Harry Rea, another member of the DHBRF Governance Group, has the unusual dual role of clinician and researcher. A practicing clinician based at Middlemore Hospital, with a joint appointment as Professor of Integrated Care and Medicine at the University of Auckland, Harry has a broader perspective than most on ways research could directly impact clinical outcomes. Harry's feedback shares a comprehensive future-thinking interpretation of chronic care management, highlighting the need for collaboration.

3. DHBRF Project Profile: Chronic Care research project

The first project funded under the DHB Research Fund was in the area of chronic disease. A request for proposals (RFP) was released in 2006 and following standard HRC assessment the Chronic Care Steering Committee selected a project led by Freemasons' Professor of Geriatric Medicine, Martin Connolly at the University of Auckland. Current models of care for these conditions have not been translated widely into practice, and Martin and his team are addressing this problem by gathering together both international and local knowledge in the area of chronic care management and putting it into an easily digestible format. The aim of the Alleviating the Burden of Chronic Conditions (ABC-NZ) Study is to find effective interventions that will improve health outcomes, particularly for Māori and Pacific peoples, who experience higher levels of chronic disease and at a much earlier stage of life.
